School safety has entered the national conversation again after the tragedy in Parkland, Florida at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, where seventeen lives were lost. Student safety is a focus for all school districts every day and in everything we do. It is a priority in any student program, activity or action. Schedules, student daily procedures and all other decisions around students have safety as the primary consideration.

In the most recent round of national conversations, many discussions and questions have been focused on building security, which is a very important part of student safety. All Schuylkill Valley School District buildings have safety and security plans for all types of emergencies and threat events. In cases where evacuation is part of the procedure, parent reunification protocols are in place. For student safety reasons, we do not make safety plans and evacuation procedures public. The plans for all events are coordinated with the Northern Berks Regional Police and they are revisited and updated.

However, there are other components to school safety beyond building security. They include the background checks required of all new district employees during the hiring process and the training of staff on safety and emergency procedures. Student safety also involves the culture and climate of a school where students feel engaged, valued and that they belong. Positive culture and climate is a goal of each of the



Schuylkill Valley School District buildings and in my short tenure here, I have had several students approach me in an unsolicited manner to let me know that they believe that their teachers care. I have also observed this in the classrooms that I have visited. Another facet of student safety is the intervention system in place where students can receive support through venues such as the student assistance program, child study teams and our district's partnership with Concern. All of these are the foundational blocks of student safety.

We will continue to promote student safety and building security in all of our schools. In order to do so, we will work to maintain positive, collaborative relationships with all of our community partners, including our local law enforcement agencies. As always, please feel free to contact me with any concerns or questions.

Each month, club members volunteer at the Leesport Church of the Holy Trinity food pantry and this spring they will serve as home field assistants for the American Cancer Society's Relay For Life, to be held at



Schuylkill Valley on May 19. A significant portion of their service involves fund raising and the club has raised \$1,450 this year. The Leos will donate \$500 to send a vision-impaired camper to Beacon Lodge in central Pennsylvania this summer, and will donate \$520 to the American Cancer Society. Volunteer service has its rewards, and our young people are making a big difference right here in our community. Well done, Leos!





# **SV Swimmers Earn Medals and Break Records**



Congratulations to senior **Colin Gwiazdowski** for his record-breaking performances this season. Colin, the son of Tom and Kathy Gwiazdowski, Ontelaunee Township, won gold at the PIAA Class 2A championship meet in the 100 freestyle, silver in the 50 free, broke the Central Penn League (CPL) record for the same distance (in the freestyle relay) at the Wilson meet in December, won the 50 freestyle at the CPL meet, won and broke the Berks County and District III 50 freestyle record at the District III meet, and won the 100 freestyle at the District III meet. Colin has accepted a scholarship to continue his athletic and academic career at the University of Arizona.







All of the participants should be very proud of their performance in spelling so many challenging words on the list. Among some of the words were "parenthetical," "merengue" and "pestiferous." Elizabeth's stellar performance in the school competition won her a spot at the Berks County Spelling Bee held on March 12 at the Miller Center for the Arts in Reading.



Sleep is vital to good health and may even prevent childhood obesity. In today's lifestyle, children are staying up much later than just a few decades ago. The childhood obesity prevalence is multifactorial, but research supports a significant link between sleep and weight. Many studies found a link between short sleep (less than 6 hours) and increased risk for weight gain. Inadequate sleep can release hormones that affect weight gain even in children. Ghrelin is a hormone that has been recently catching interest, as it is an appetitestimulating hormone that increases with diminished sleep quality.

Length of sleep and sleep quality can be affected by many things. Screen time before bed may be a contributing factor to shorten sleep time, decreasing the quality of sleep in children. Fluorescent lights are considered to interrupt sleep quality if used one hour before bed. Interestingly, this is not shown in children who read before bed.

Children ages 3-6 years old need ten to twelve hours of sleep, ages 7-12 need ten to eleven hours of sleep and ages 13-18 need eight to nine hours of sleep. Small changes can make a big difference. Limit electronic use before bed, have children do homework before activities if later in the evening, read before bed, and have a set bedtime schedule and routine.

Mrs. Moyer worked with **Dr. Deborah Schmeck**, gifted support and middle school reading specialist, who asked her students to suggest their favorite book characters. After compiling a three-page list, Mrs. Moyer designed

the mural to feature seventyfive different characters, including Harry Potter, Winnie The Pooh, the Cat in the Hat, Clifford, Corduroy and Alice in Wonderland.

The students were amazed to watch her process over the next year. Starting in February,



2016, Mrs. Moyer worked on the mural for fourteen months after school, on holidays and during the summer. First, she sketched it in pencil, then painted the large areas, went back in to create the details, edited certain areas when she wasn't happy, and finally gave it a glossing to protect it. In addition, Mrs. Moyer donated all the materials and time to complete the mural. Mrs. Moyer is now working on a biography wall at the middle school library with depictions of twenty-eight important faces throughout history from the fifth through eighth-grade curriculum, including President Lincoln, Anne Frank and Albert Einstein. The artist says it is a labor of love to create these magical spaces in our schools. "I have been with the district for eighteen years," said Mrs. Moyer, "and I love my job, so I wanted to create a gift for the children and staff of Schuylkill Valley past, present and future." How lucky we are!

Students are expected to wear the required gym uniform for the first day of class activity.


