On February 28, the Board of Directors of the Schuylkill Valley School District appointed **Dr. Cynthia Mierzejewski** to a four-year term as the new superintendent, effective July 1, 2017. Dr. Mierzejewski, currently the acting superintendent in the Wilson (West Lawn) School District, will serve as assistant to **Dr. Warren Mata** during a transitional period from May 30 to June 30. Dr. Mata will continue in his role as

superintendent until his retirement on June 30.

Formerly the assistant superintendent at Wilson, Dr. Mierzejewski holds a doctorate in educational leadership from Immaculata University, a Masters of Education in Curriculum and Instruction and Elementary and Secondary Principal's Certificates from Penn State University, and a Bachelor of Science in chemistry from Alvernia University.

Her professional background also includes employment as the director, assistant director and program administrator at the Berks County Intermediate Unit, junior/senior high school principal in the Tulpehocken Area School District, assistant principal at Fleetwood Area High School, and chemistry teacher at Fleetwood, Wilson and Reading Central Catholic high schools. Dr. Mierzejewski has also served as adjunct faculty at

A culture that promotes academic excellence, responds to the needs and interests of young adolescent students, and commits itself to helping all students achieve at a high level has once again earned the middle school the distinction of being designated as a "Pennsylvania School To Watch." Schuylkill Valley is one of only 38 schools in Pennsylvania, and 400 schools nationwide, to receive this designation. According to Dr. Warren Mata, superintendent of the district, this award recognizes the unique, student-centered environment created by teachers and staff who love working with middle school-aged children and put their needs first. "In an era where test scores seem to be the only measure of school success, this award shows that our middle school is a great place to help children navigate some of the difficulties of the adolescent years," Dr. Mata said in a recent interview with the Hamburg Item. Mr. Joshua Kuehner, principal at the middle school, agreed. "The administration and faculty are dedicated to educating the children of the community in a

way that addresses the whole student, not just the academics component of education," he said. "The stability of our program guides students on the right track to a successful future." Activities like the STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) program, Genius Hour, outdoor education camp and fun, team-building events in the student advocacy program highlight the middle school's four focus areas – organization, responsibility, cooperation and respect. "The dedication of the faculty and support of the administration and community at SV allow for growth and discovery in an ever-changing world," said Mr. Kuehner.

#### SUCCESS STARTS HERE

In September, 2016, the Pennsylvania School Board Association launched its "Success Starts Here" media campaign to share the good news about public education in our state. Schuylkill Valley participated in the project by submitting a story detailing the extraordinary amount of co-curricular activities offered in the district. Our administration believes that advisor-supported and student led activities contribute to SV's high graduation rate. ### **Success Starts Here**

The Schuylkill Valley School District is alive with activity! The campus, with an enrollment of 2,054 students in three schools, offers more than fifty diverse clubs and activities. The high school alone boasts a seventy-five percent participation rate in co-curriculars. All of this is possible through a unique partnership between students and faculty.

According to Athletic Director Stephanie L. Deibler, who oversees co-curricular activity, the district's culture allows students and faculty to work together for a common good. "Student participation is high because we try as much as possible to allow and encourage kids to try different activities outside their comfort zone," Miss Deibler said. At the high school, students can start their own clubs with approval from Principal Mr. Michael Mitchell and Miss Deibler. The school provides a faculty advisor, classroom space and a weekly activity period during school hours so that students can explore a multitude of interests without conflicting with after-school activities. The diversity of co-curriculars, from rock climbing, to welfare of animals, to agricultural club

and more, encourages students to reach beyond the usual to acquire new skills. No one club or activity is given priority over another, and coaches and advisors are guided not to pressure students to focus solely on one activity. This creates a culture of inclusivity, where a football player can also participate in the school musical and serve as student council president.

"We make sure our teachers. advisors, coaches and music directors understand that a school district isn't just what goes on between seven in the morning and three in the afternoon," Miss Deibler explained. Faculty and staff advise co-curriculars with the understanding that the activities are as much a part of students' future success as the district's academic component. "All of our co-curriculars are imbedded into our teacher's union contract," Miss Deibler said. "But most of our faculty want to advise because they know that it's good for students, their families and our community. We all want to make sure that when kids leave here. they're prepared to be better leaders."



### **Breakfast is the Most Important Meal of the Day**

### Top 5 reasons SV Panthers should NOT skip breakfast:

- 1. Children who skip breakfast will tend to eat MORE calories throughout the day.
- 2. Breakfast consumption not only makes children more attentive, but can also help them focus and thrive during the school day.
- 3. Most breakfast foods provide essential nutrients such as iron, calcium, vitamin D and fiber.
- 4. Studies show that adolescents who eat breakfast regularly maintain a normal weight range.
- 5. Children who eat breakfast miss LESS school and reduce the risk of illnesses.



#### Quick breakfast ideas:

- 1. Oatmeal with sliced bananas or blueberries.
- 2. Whole grain toaster waffles and peanut butter.
- 3. Breakfast taco scrambled eggs and cheese in a warm taco shell. Top with salsa!
- 4. Yogurt and fruit topped with low-fat granola.
- 5. Whole grain toast topped with peanut butter and a banana, cheese or cottage cheese and apple butter.
- 6. Hard boiled eggs and an English muffin.
- 7. Fruit and yogurt smoothie.

Students in all grades were invited to collect pledges for reading books during a one-week period in January. The goal was to motivate young people to read and instill a life-long love of reading. On March 3, in conjunction with

"Read Across America Week," students celebrated their accomplishment at a Panther Pride Assembly where those who collected at least \$10 in pledges were entered into a drawing to "pie" Mrs. Missy Kelchner, principal, or Mrs. Melissa Rhoads, assistant principal. Later this spring, members of the Reading Fightin' Phillies baseball team will join students at the school to congratulate and inspire them at a special assembly.



### **Teachers in the Parks**

One of the nicest things about summer is spending time in the beauty of a park. This summer, students who will be in third and fourth grade during the 2017-2018 school year can play - and learn - while they are exploring the outdoors, too.

"Teachers In The Parks (TIPS)," a six-week program that focuses on fun ways to learn math and science, will again be offered to SVES students this summer.

Last year, Ms. Heather Hummel, Mrs. Sandra Borkey, Mrs. Sandra Griffiths and Mr. Joel Kleinspehn, all teachers at the elementary

school, led a group of twelve students in twice-weekly activities at the park pavilion between the Schuylkill Valley Community Library and the Leesport Pool. Themes for each week included oceans, insects, camping, summer Olympics, space, carnivals and parks, and the activities incor-

porated books and experiments to match each theme. Students created an ocean in a bottle, hiked on the Schuylkill River Trail, participated in an insect scavenger hunt, made solar oven s'mores in pizza boxes and held a mini-Olympics based on math games. According to Ms. Hummel, the program didn't seem like summer school because the students were having so much fun they didn't realize they were learning. "Our goal was to make learning fun while creating a long-lasting program that helps some of our students bridge the summer learning gap," Ms. Hummel said. "So many times when we're in the classroom we're told what we have to teach. With

TIPS we got to be innovative and creative, and to integrate all the subjects that we enjoy." Students, too, felt the joy of learning. Third-grader Katlin Kier, daughter of Timothy and Bethanne Kier of Leesport, said her favorite part of TIPS was the nature hike. "I liked when we walked on the Schuylkill River Trail and had to find certain bugs," Katlin said. "We also did voga and it was funny when Mr. K. tried to do yoga." Taylor Riggins, another third grader and the daughter of **Donald** and **Marian Riggins** of Leesport, encouraged other children to attend.
