## Panther Pride Stadium Renovations Groundbreaking


The first steps toward renovating Schuylkill Valley's 55-year-old stadium, turf and track began at a Groundbreaking Ceremony on May 22 attended by school board directors, administration, coaches, Panther Pride Stadium committee volunteers, student athletes and staff. The renovations, with a projected completion date of September, 2017, include installation of an artificial turf playing field for multiple sports, an all-weather track surface, new lighting, a press box and a new ticket booth entrance. The stadium currently has a grass field and one of the last remaining cinder tracks in the county.

The long-overdue improvements to the stadium facilities will provide for more cost-effective maintenance and upkeep, reduce physical education and athletic-related injuries, and offer all SV students and athletes updated facilities that allow them to participate and compete at a higher level with enhanced experiences and opportunities comparable to those of other school districts across the county. The installation of an all-weather track and regulation-size turf playing field will en-

able expanded use of the stadium facilities to accommodate outdoor athletic team field sports (football, soccer, field hockey and lacrosse); invitational and play-off athletic events that generate revenue for the District; local youth athletic programs; and events benefiting the community at large (Special Olympics, Relay for Life, etc.).

In October 2016, the Schuylkill Valley School District Board of Directors voted in favor of funding the initial phase of the project and, as a result, residents will not be asked to shoulder the cost at this time. The SV Panther Pride Stadium Committee. formed as a 501(c)(3) volunteer organization in November, 2014, has raised funds and community support through solicitation of digital scoreboard and stadium sponsors, annual golf outing fundraisers, custom t-shirt sales, personalized brick paver orders for the new Panther Pride Pathway, and various individual donor and athletic organization contributions.

"To earn this award, the district had to substantially conform to the award program's demanding criteria," Rep. Jozwiak said. "These requirements include developing and implementing a financial plan that supports student learning and instructional priorities." 
## **Elementary Students Get Comfy for a Good Cause**
