SV Elementary School Earns Prestigious Award from International Literacy Association

The International Literary Association (ILA) has selected Schuylkill Valley Elementary School for its 2018 Exemplary Reading Program Award, in recognition of its outstanding reading and language arts curriculum. The school triumphed over one hundred other elementary school programs in Pennsylvania to win the award, which is given to only one school in the state each year.

Mrs. Melissa Kelchner, principal, and Mrs. Melissa Rhoads, assistant principal, worked to shine a light on the school by researching eligibility for different awards. "I know how hard our faculty and staff works and I felt it was time for some public recognition for all of the good being done here," Mrs. Kelchner said. "We knew this would be a longshot because there is only one school recognized in each state. And we decided to do it. anyway because we believe so strongly that our elementary school is a blue ribbon school."

The administrators completed a lengthy and detailed application process and were thrilled when they were notified they had earned a site visit. They prepared for the

three assessors from the Keystone State Reading Association's (KSRA) visit to the school by making available different elements of the reading program, including autistic support, supplemental reading, inclusion classrooms, WIN (What I Need) in grade levels, paraprofessional support, reading staff and reading specialist collaboration and the Reading Olympics program. "The assessors were very impressed because we eat, sleep and breathe reading here," Mrs. Kelchner explained. "We are a data-driven school and we keep our programs current so that we aren't stagnant, and every child can reach his or her potential at various developmental rates."

This summer, Mrs. Rhoads will represent Pennsylvania when she attends the ILA's annual conference in Austin, Texas to receive the award, and a contingent of administrative staff and reading specialists from the elementary school will attend the KSRA conference at Penn State University in October. In addition, the elementary school will proudly dedicate an outdoor sign proclaiming the recognition at a ceremony in June.








Fourth Grade Chorus Leads Crowd in National Anthem

The PACER test measures an individual's aerobic endurance. During the fitness unit, students learned about and targeted the main health-related components of fitness (aerobic/cardio fitness, muscular strength, muscular endurance and flexibility). Throughout the school year, students develop these components during their warm-up, in preparation for the fitness assessment measures, as well as their overall wellness.
