SVHS Among Top Schools in Nation

US News and World Report has selected Schuylkill Valley High School as one of the nation's best high schools. SV was ranked number 4,274 out of 23,000 schools, placing the high school in the top 20% of all schools ranked. The criteria used to judge the schools included the following:

- College readiness, based on the proportion of 12th-grade students who took and passed Advanced Placement (AP) and/or International Baccalaureate (IB) exams.
- College curriculum breadth, based on the proportion of 12th-grade students who took and passed AP and/or IB exams in multiple content areas.
- Math and reading proficiency, based on student performance on state-required tests.
- Math and reading performance, based on whether performance on state assessments exceeded expectations, given the school's proportion of underserved students.
- Underserved student performance, based on how African American, Hispanic and low-income students performed on state assessments, compared with those who are not underserved in the state.

• Graduation rates, based on the proportion of students who entered ninth grade in 2012 and graduated four years later.

Mr. Michael Mitchell, high school principal, offered his sincere gratitude to the high school staff. "Congratulations to all of you for your hard work, sacrifices and commitment to our students," he said, "We will continue our quest to become a better high school each and every day by simply doing what's best for kids."

Future Medical Professionals of America Club

The Future Medical Professionals of America (FMPA) is a community service club at Schuylkill Valley High School in its second year. Officers of the club include seniors **Charanya Birabaharan**, founder and president, and **Megan Torok**, vice-president. The club holds fundraisers to buy clothing, books and materials for patients in the Reading Hospital system, and attends events to learn more about healthcare professions.

Advised by Mrs. Kelly Musket, physical education teacher, club members have volunteered at The Reading Hospital Road Run, contributed money to The Red Corner Benefit, which helps families with children fighting cancer, developed and held the "Strides for Shomo" fundraiser, in which they raised \$1,542 for senior Jessie Shomo's Neurofibromatosis Team Walk in June, and sponsored a nurse as a guest speaker to talk to the club. In addition, the club has held five blood

drives at the high school over the past two years, collecting nearly 100 pints of blood from students and staff.

Because of this accomplishment, the Miller-Keystone Blood Center awarded Schuylkill Valley High School a \$250 scholarship for the club's efforts in coordinating the blood drives. The winners of the scholarship, Charanya Birabaharan and Dorothy Davidheiser, were announced on May 15 at the Miller-Keystone Recognition Breakfast at the Doubletree Hotel in Reading, which was also attended by Megan Torok and five-pint-plus donor, Scott Horning, a senior. In addition, the high school was awarded the Angela Hohl Memorial Award for having the highest increase, by 116%, in pints of blood donated. At graduation, several seniors received a red cord in their graduation packet for donating blood at least four times in their high school career.



Commended Scholar Riley Pontician

Senior Riley Pontician, daughter of John and Linda Pontician of Leesport, has been named a commended scholar in the National Merit Scholarship Program. Commended scholars are among a group of the 50,000 top scorers in the nation on the PSAT test. At Schuylkill Valley, Riley participates in the student council, is an executive committee member of the Pennsylvania Youth Education Association, and a captain in the Science Olympiad. Last fall, Riley was Schuylkill Valley's representative in the

Berks County Outstanding Young Woman competition and is a member of the National Honor Society, the girls' soccer and lacrosse teams, Leo club, *Pantherette*, Schuylkill Valley ambassadors, mock trial and fall play. She volunteers at the local food bank, helped to plan the high school's mini-THON for the Four Diamonds Fund, and assists with Special Olympics. 

Some of their innovations were highlighted at the Genius Festival TED Talks, including Alexis Seymour's illustrations for a book entitled "Mommy Not Maid," Lance Gribbins' design for an under-skateboard first aid kit, and Jenna Kirby's Winnie-The-Pooh mural painted in memory of her grandmother.
